The architect's role, when possible, is to go beyond reductive consensus. We can develop possibilities of realization that were previously unimagined.

Architecture can be variously all-encompassing, technical and aesthetic, varying in scale, inherently collaborative, utterly creative, and aspirational, all toward the uplifting, betterment, and improvement of humanity and the world in which we live.
