KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



JEREMY N. FOLEY, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR EMERITUS, UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

Jeremy N. Foley is the athletic director emeritus at the University of Florida. From 1992 to 2016, he handled virtually every aspect of the university's \$119.3 million athletic program in a career which began with an internship in the Gator Ticket Office in 1976. During his tenure, the university invested \$397 million in projects he spearheaded, including the expansion of the O'Connell Center and an indoor football practice facility. He also outlined a \$100 million master facility plan.

Foley is the only athletic director in Division I history to supervise a program that won multiple national titles in football (1996, 2006, 2008) and men's basketball (2006, 2007). Overall, 27 UF teams were crowned national champions on his watch.

What does effective, inspiring leadership look like in an era of accelerated change? In his keynote address, Foley will share his winning formula in the context of building dynamic teams to position the architecture profession to evolve and thrive into the future.



DAVID ZACH – FUTURIST

"I can't predict the future," says David Zach, "but knew you might have wondered." David Zach is one of the few professionally trained futurists on the planet. He holds an M.S. in futures research from University of Houston-Clear Lake, as well as a B.A. in political science from University of Wisconsin. His meta perspective encompassing design, aesthetics, emotional IQ, artificial intelligence and more has surprised and challenged diverse audiences for over four decades.

Zach has given over 1,500 keynote presentations, including more than 50 with AIA and AIAS audiences. His goal is to inspire others to be more curious, humble, and communicative with anyone on the other side of the issue – or even on the other side of the table.

Zach says, "The divorcing of the generations and segregating them into their own self-referential worlds feeds our ignorance and arrogance." Whether he is connecting generations, fields of research, or theoretical frameworks, his discussions bridge the gap - making him a perfect fit for this forum.

Zach's first session, "Finding Clarity and Connection in Uncertain Times," touches on artificial intelligence, algorithms and automation. His second session, on sharpening presentation skills, inspires us to "think in 360 degrees" to facilitate a true exchange of understanding.



GERALD J.J. CREADON, EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, OPERATIONS AT JABIL

Gerald Creadon is an accomplished senior executive in the high-tech global manufacturing services industry. He holds an MBA from the University of Florida Warrington College of Business and has over 20 years of experience managing operations, factory profits and losses, and Fortune 100 customer relationships. His experience managing international business spans the United States, China, Brazil, Mexico, Southeast Asia and Europe. He brings extensive expertise on global macro trends and their impact on the real estate market, building design, the manufacturing supply chain, emerging automation, digital technologies, and the role of technology in designing for the future.

Creadon's presentation, "Implications for Design in a Global Market: Industry Perspective on Trends Impacting Industrial and Office Space" will help us consider what optimal design looks like in this era of change and disruption, paying special attention to technology, clean energy, and more.



DR. JOSEPH CHOMA, PH.D.

Dr. Joseph Choma, Ph.D., is director of the School of Architecture and professor of architecture at Florida Atlantic University. Choma is founder and director of the Design Topology Lab, an interdisciplinary practice which conducts design research and consults on material innovation, unconventional means and methods of construction, and the role of geometry in the built environment. His topics of exploration include foldable structures and materials, lightweight deployable shelters, ultra-thin formwork for concrete casting, stay-in-place formwork for shell structures and concrete slabs and advancements in natural fiber textiles. As a researcher, he uses mathematics, folding, structure and materials as generative design devices to imagine new ways to design and build more sustainably.

Choma and co-presenter Daniel Bolojan will showcase an undergraduate design studio at Florida Atlantic University School of Architecture, where students fashioned provocative building designs using machine learning to interpolate three-dimensional data sets into self-organizing maps. In the realm of material intelligence, Choma will demonstrate how innovative construction can reduce the carbon footprint, spotlighting, in particular, techniques using ultra-thin folded paper formwork for concrete casting.



DANIEL BOLOJAN

Daniel Bolojan is an assistant professor at Florida Atlantic University focusing on the application of computational design and deep learning strategies in architecture and the architectural design process. Over the years, he has taught several design studios and seminars at the Institute of Structure and Design-University of Innsbruck and Florida International University-Miami and conducted numerous international workshops and conference workshops, dealing with the application of complex systems and neural networks in architectural design. He brings expertise to the examination of how artificial intelligence is evolving how we teach, design, and build.

Bolojan will address the impacts of artificial intelligence on architecture theory, design and structure. He will spotlight the dialogue between academic research and professional practice, tapping his experience providing cutting-edge consulting for international offices such as Coop Himmelb(l)au and Zaha Hadid Architects.



MICHELE A. RUSSO, LEED AP

Michele Russo is the vice president of research & practice at the American Institute of Architects where she is responsible for advancing architectural practice including the research and data necessary to help businesses thrive and professionals advance in their careers. In this role, she oversees the delivery of programs, products, tools, and resources to support the goals of member and firm prosperity. She is a frequent presenter providing insights on economic, firm, and disruptive trends affecting the ability for architectural firms and professionals to navigate current and future conditions. Russo previously worked for Dodge Data & Analytics where she ran its SmartMarket market research program providing data and intelligence on AEC industry trends, most notably sustainable design and construction, technology, and workforce.

Russo will discuss the economic outlook and what we should be watching to track the economy. She will also cover what trends and pressures are facing the profession—and industry—over the next 18 months, including emerging developments that will shape the future.

Reducing the carbon emissions associated with producing our built environment (“embodied carbon”) is critical to ensuring that we protect our planet for generations to come. Adaptive reuse and historic renovation projects are one way that architects and structural engineers can potentially dramatically reduce the embodied carbon of projects for a “sustainability win.” These projects come with challenges and limitations but also can yield great benefits to end users. Asking the right questions and doing careful field evaluations at the start of these projects and throughout the design process – and understanding the tools available to our team – makes it possible for design teams to overcome the challenges of using an existing space for new purposes while reducing embodied carbon. Creativity will enable our profession to find success as we seek to use what we already have rather than “building new” on green-field sites.

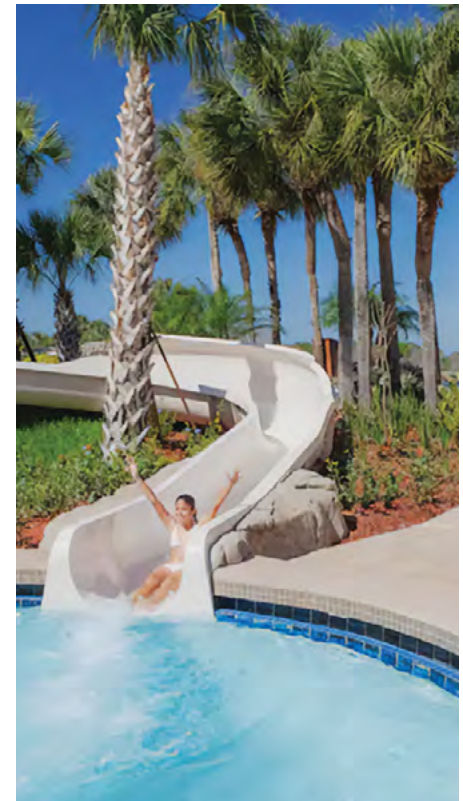
